GARDEN GROWS QUALITY



Dedicated EECM volunteers, with the help of Highmark Wholecare volunteers, have planted and are maintaining this season's raised-bed garden. At harvest time, the fresh garden produce will be distributed to food pantry clients and used in the EECM Community Kitchen to add quality to meals.

The EECM volunteers working non-stop in our food pantry will tell you that they've never seen anything like it. That goes for kitchen volunteers who serve the free community lunch in the EECM dining room as well. What they are witnessing is non-stop clients lining up for food or a daily meal.

In fact, our volunteers continue to see double the number of food-insecure people. Compared to this time last year, EECM is seeing a 110% increase in demand for our food pantry services. At our community lunch each weekday, nearly every seat is taken in the dining room. There are rarely any leftover takeout brown bag lunches.

Increasing food prices and other factors have prevented our impov-

erished neighbors from making ends meet with their monthly budgets. The Food Pantry now sees



a monthly average of nearly 1900 individual and family visits and that's the highest monthly numbers on record.

PENNSYLVANIA CABINET SECRETARY AND ALLEGHENY COUNTY EXECUTIVE HOLD PRESS CONFERENCE AT COMMUNITY HOUSE

East End Cooperative Ministry's CEO Rev. Darnell Leonard, and VP for Development and PR, Michael Bartley recently hosted state and local dignitaries for a major news conference in the EECM Great Room.

Pennsylvania Secretary of Human Services, Dr. Val Arkoosh announced Medicaid access for low-income Pennsylvanians while praising EECM's unyielding commitment in providing food and housing to vulnerable residents for more decades.

Arkoosh was joined by Allegheny County Executive Rich Fitzgerald, State Senator Lindsey Williams and many other political and social service leaders from throughout Pittsburgh.

Fitzgerald singled out EECM as an "always dependable" Pittsburgh organization that consis-


EECM STAFF SHOWS THEIR GRATITUDE BY SERVING OUR VOLUNTEERS AND HONORING THEIR DEDICATION

MEETING THE NEED FOR SHELTER

This past winter, EECM officially became an "overflow shelter" for new shelter clients to get safely indoors from bitterly cold nights. Our housing services set up new mattresses and bedding. The clients were also fed in our dining room and had access to our many EECM services, including our food pantry, education, employment and more.

It went so well that recently the Allegheny County Department of Human Services contacted our Director of Housing, Nicole Harrington to inquire whether we could expand our housing services now, given the sharp increase in Pittsburgh's homeless population. In downtown Pittsburgh, homeless residents are being displaced with the closing of a shelter on Smithfield Street. Additionally, the new low barrier shelter on Second Avenue is overcrowded and without vacancies on most nights.

Harrington and EECM CEO, Rev. Darnell Leonard met with county officials who expressed hope that EECM, given our decades of service with homelessness, would be able to expand to accommodate the need. Currently, EECM has 51 overnight beds, 31 for our Recovery Center and 20 for our Shelter.

"After inspecting the many rooms in our building, we found several rooms we could use," said Harrington. So, in the coming weeks, EECM will be expanding shelter services to include 15 more overnight beds now, and perhaps another 10 in the coming months. EECM Housing Services is busy buying new beds, mattresses, and related materials to make sure the newly offered services are consistent with our existing top-notch homeless shelter services.

EECM thanks our devoted staff and volunteers and of course our generous donors for getting us to a place where we can respond quickly to assist homeless clients with housing and food.

As a quiet force, Mr. Dan Hawkins is an inspiration to our staff, our volunteers, and our clients every single day as he dedicates himself with humility and gratitude.

Mr. Hawkins, who has been clean and sober for 29 years, is in the perfect job. He's a Peer Support Specialist in the Housing and Employment Services Department. Among other duties, Dan works one on one and in groups with our residential clients in alcohol and drug addiction recovery.

"It is an honor and pleasure to work alongside Mr. Hawkins," says Nicole Harrington, EECM Director of Housing and Employment Services.

"Our recovery center is second to none," Hawkins says and "I'm proud to be a small part of it. We see successes every day but it's not easy." Hawkins says newer, more addictive drugs are challenging these days, but working the program and following the rules here at EECM produces consistent success for clients.

Hawkins is grateful for the 17 years he has worked in EECM's recovery programs saying, "It gives me a purpose in life and eliminates my addiction past from being worthless; meaning, what I continue to learn here helps me not to make the same mistakes I've made in the past."

Hawkins says, "It's a one-day-at-a-time program and you're never getting sober or clean by yourself and that's why we're all in this together here at EECM." We, too, are grateful every single day that Dan Hawkins is here to inspire us.
